A Message From the Mayor

Spring sure did pass quickly! Hopefully, everyone had a moment to appreciate the array of spring flowers and blossoming trees that put on a great show for every resident and guest of Shrewsbury. There was no shortage of community events the past couple of months. A note of thanks to all our community volunteers and participants who helped tally up one successful event after another.

Traditionally, the annual Memorial Day celebration at Patriot Isle serves as time to honor our veterans. This year, the Shrewsbury Towne-Monmouth Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution participated in the ceremonies to rededicate the plaque originally unveiled on June 28, 1935 to acknowledge the Delaware Trail used by the Indians and later by Washington's troops on the Burlington Path. Thanks to DAR members Elizabeth Dunnell, Rita Kline, and Jo Ann Slocum-Mazzucca, with support from DPW, the plaque will continue to note the importance of Shrewsbury's cornerstone.

The property behind the Monmouth County Library has been purchased by Toll Brothers. It is anticipated that the company will begin construction of the 66 approved units "*The Enclave at Shrewsbury*" early this summer. Coupled with the transfer of ownership of this property was the renaming of two streets within the site. One street will be named ***Dorn Drive*** in honor of Shrewsbury's Marine PFC Philip K. Dorn ("Tinker") who was killed by sniper fire in Vietnam in June, 1966. The other thoroughfare will be named ***Campbell Court*** in honor of former Shrewsbury resident Pvt. Robert R. Campbell, who was killed in action in Italy in March, 1944. It is most fitting and appropriate to honor these two individuals who gave their lives in the defense of our nation.

Congratulations is extended to Kayla Schneider-Smith who was honored in a proclamation read at the RBR Senior Awards Program on June 4th. Shrewsbury's Mayor & Council recognized her academic achievement as the highest ranking Shrewsbury senior at Red Bank Regional High School.

Shrewsbury's Boy Scout Troop #50 will soon be honoring its 100th Eagle. Evan Tyler, will attain the coveted Award. Coincidentally, Evan's next-door neighbor, William Schindler, was Shrewsbury's 50th Eagle Scout so honored in 1989.

On a personal note, my wife and I had the good fortune of visiting Shrewsbury, England in late March where we were the guests of Mayor Tony Durnell and Mayoress Tricia Durnell. One of the highlights of the daylong visit was a presentation of a framed collection of embroidered patches from Shrewsbury Hose Co. # 1, First Aid Squad, and Police Department. Shrewsbury Officer's Father Honored at the Vietnam Veterans Memorial Wall

Patrolman Frank Neary, Jr. of the Shrewsbury Police Department was recently invited to lay a wreath at the Memorial Day ceremony at the Vietnam Veterans Wall in Washington, DC. Frank and his family were invited guests of the Secretary of Veterans Affairs, Erik Shinseki, and got to meet and speak with President Barack Obama and Vice President Joe Biden, as well as, several other distinguished guests.

The ceremony, hosted by actor and long-time veteran spokesperson Tom Selleck, was a Memorial Day remembrance of the men and women who gave their lives in service to our Nation and marked the official addition of 10 new names to The Wall. Frank's father was one of the names added this year.

Corporal Frank Neary (USMC) was shot in the leg in Vietnam in 1967. He spent the next several years in a body cast, enduring numerous surgeries and relearning to walk. After returning from Vietnam, he assisted in numerous Veteran charities and support organizations. He succumbed to his wounds in 2006 on the same day he was to have yet another surgery on his leg. After a lengthy investigation, the Department of Defense determined that he died from the wounds sustained during his service in Vietnam.

"It was a privilege to lay the wreath and talk with so many important people, but it was truly an honor to sit amongst the thousands of Veterans that were in attendance," said Frank. "They make it their duty to come to The Wall year in and year out to make sure that these names are not forgotten. I was humbled beyond words to be a small part of their remembrance."

Corporal Neary's name is located on panel 15E, line 96 of The Wall.

This award is in memory of Tommy Maletto, a charter member and founding member of the Shrewsbury First Aid Squad who gave of himself for many years helping others. The Shrewsbury Hose Company Hurricane Season is Here

Hurricane season officially started June 1st, and many of us may not be prepared if you find yourself in the midst of such foul weather. If recent extreme weather events ranging from last year's Hurricane Irene, to major flooding, did not persuade you to plan for the unexpected, please take few simple steps to get ready.

Step 1 - Build a kit or To-Go-Bag: Get an [Emergency Supply Kit](#), which includes items like non-perishable food, water, a battery-powered or hand-crank radio, extra flashlights, and batteries. You may want to prepare a portable kit as well.

You may need to survive on your own after an emergency. This means having your own food, water, and other supplies in sufficient quantity to last for at least three days. In addition, basic services such as electricity, gas, water, sewage treatment, and telephones may be cut off. Additional, items to include are: first aid kit, prescription medication, infant formula and diapers, pet food, cash, change of clothing, and fire extinguisher.

Step 2 – Make a plan: Make a [Family Emergency Plan](#). Your family may not be together when disaster strikes, so it is important to know how you will contact one another, how you will get back together, and what you will do in case of an emergency. You should also consider: Evacuation plans, Family communications, and Utility shut-off in an emergency.

Step 3 – Be informed: Hurricane hazards come in many forms: [lightning](#), [tornadoes](#), [flooding](#), [storm surge](#), and [high winds](#). Look carefully at the safety actions associated with each type of hurricane hazard and prepare your family disaster plan accordingly. Just remember that this is only a guide. The first and most important thing anyone should do when facing a hurricane threat is to use common sense. Secure your property by removing any loose items outside your home that may become projectiles. Check your sump pumps and generators. Make sure you don't operate gas powered equipment indoors. The fire department has only limited capability to assist you with flooded basements, and you will need the tools necessary to keep water out. Check: www.ready.gov for more information.

Clerk's Office

Facility Use forms needed for organized activities on Borough Property:

If you plan to use any of our borough fields, parks or buildings for organized parties or events (weddings, reunions, birthday parties, etc.), you must first fill out a facility use form with the Clerk's Office. The application explains the Borough restrictions as to the allowable hours of use, the prohibition of alcohol and tobacco, etc. Once the Police Dept. approves the application, the Clerk's Office will ask for a \$100 refundable security deposit and a Certificate of Insurance naming the Borough as additional insured for the time and date of your event. (Most homeowner's insurance companies provide this readily to their customers). If the request relates to the use of a borough field, we will check with the Borough Recreation Dept. field scheduler to see if the space is available for the date and time of your event.

Door-to-Door Solicitations:

Approval by the Clerk's Office and the Police Department is required of anyone soliciting or canvassing in the Borough of Shrewsbury. Exemptions exist for our police, volunteer fire and first aid personnel, children 18 or younger representing any of the following groups: Boy/Girl Scouts, local grammar/high school educational fundraisers, local recreation/travel sports teams. Residents are encouraged to ask solicitors for proof of Borough approval which will be in the form of a badge or certification letter signed by our Clerk, Kathy Krueger. If the solicitor does not have this approval, we encourage you to contact the Police Department at 732-741-2500. Please note that under Federal Law we are not allowed to deny a solicitation request from a non-profit organization as long as our requests for proof of exempt status and a list of volunteers, is provided. "For-profit" organizations/individuals must meet several requirements under Borough Code - Chapter 132; a current Borough Business License, a satisfactorily completed background check including fingerprinting. All solicitors need to follow our Borough Code of Conduct, which involves removing themselves from any premises immediately after being asked to leave. Solicitors are also instructed that if you have any type of sign/notice posted, they may not knock or enter upon your premises.

On June 7, The Garden Club of New Jersey Inc. presented the Shrewsbury Garden Club (SGC) with the prestigious Violet M Bennett Environmental Award for its efforts to promote water conservation through its Rain Barrel Initiative. A beautiful silver pitcher was presented to Chairperson Robin Blair at the 87th Annual Meeting in Bridgewater, NJ. The Rain Barrel Initiative included a Make-Your-Own-Rain Barrel workshop conducted in May 2011, and the donation of a rain barrel by the Club to the Shrewsbury Historical Society for watering the cottage garden. Rain Barrels provide a real benefit to the community.

Also at the GCNJ Annual Meeting, the SGC was proud to receive a \$500 grant from the GCNJ and the N.J. Department of Agriculture for the new Shrewsbury Community Garden. The Shrewsbury Community Garden was one of only three community gardens in the state to receive the award. The money will be used to help defray costs associated with the garden’s start-up, including soil testing.

Shade Tree Buck Rub

It happens in the fall. Male deer, known as bucks, rub their antlers on small trees – ones with 1-3 inch caliper trunks. They do this to mark their territory, to remove velvet from their antlers, and sometimes to help remove the previous years' antlers. All of this scraping severely damages the tree. According to Rutgers Cooperative Extension Forestry specialist Mark Vodak, "Even if it doesn't break the tree in half, the removal of the phloem, cambium, and xylem, may eventually kill the tree."

Prevention

- Make a protective cylinder around the tree's lower trunk with wooden snow fencing. (Wooden snow fence is the type used on beaches. It measures 4 feet high and is made of wooden slats held together by galvanized wire.) The cylinder should be an inch wider than the trunk of the tree, and closed firmly so the deer cannot push the slats apart. If it's too wide, the deer will try to get its antlers inside of it; too narrow and the wires from the fence may scrape the tree trunk when the deer tries to spin it around.
- Place corrugated plastic sleeves or flexible drainpipe around trunks. Remember to remove for spring and summer months so that insects and disease don't flourish.
- Surround small trees with 2-inch diameter garden stakes that are at least 4 to 5 feet high and serve to deflect any rubbing.
- Stake 3-5 posts about a foot from the tree. This will create the image that the tree is too big to fit their antlers around.

**From the Office of the Tax Assessor
Revaluation Information**

The Borough of Shrewsbury has been ordered, by the Monmouth County Board of Taxation, to perform a revaluation of all property located within the Borough. This process will be performed by Realty Appraisal Company who, after several months of preparation, has begun property inspections. Please note that the revaluation process requires interior inspection, exterior measurement and data collection. Note further that your cooperation in the process adds to the quality, and fairness, of the final product and is greatly appreciated. The field personnel have been supplied with and will predominantly display photo identification and may have questions for you in regard to the property. Please assist them in these inquiries.

To respond to several recent questions please note: they will not be taking any interior photographs of any property, the field personnel are not the people who will eventually do the final analysis of the value the property, they are trained to collect data significant to the valuation process on the specifics of the property. As such, they cannot discuss the "value" of the property. The process will go on throughout the summer, into the fall. The actual date of value, for 2013 assessments, is October 1, 2012. Value analysis will be done thereafter, and the results will be communicated to all property owners later in this year. The new assessment will be "on-the-books" for 2013, and your annual postcard, delivered on or before February 1st will reflect the new assessment.
